When will the project start?

The earliest anticipated start date for the 12th Avenue parking improvements is May 11th. We expect that phase to take 10-12 weeks.

The classroom construction will begin in June after the school year ends. The classroom phase will take approximately 10-11 months to complete.

Where will I park during construction?

The main parking lot will be available until classroom construction begins. The Avery Street lot is available now and will continue to be available for weekend Masses (see below for map). We are also fortunate to be located in a walkable neighborhood with street parking throughout - please be mindful of our neighbors and do not block any driveways.

How can I support this effort?

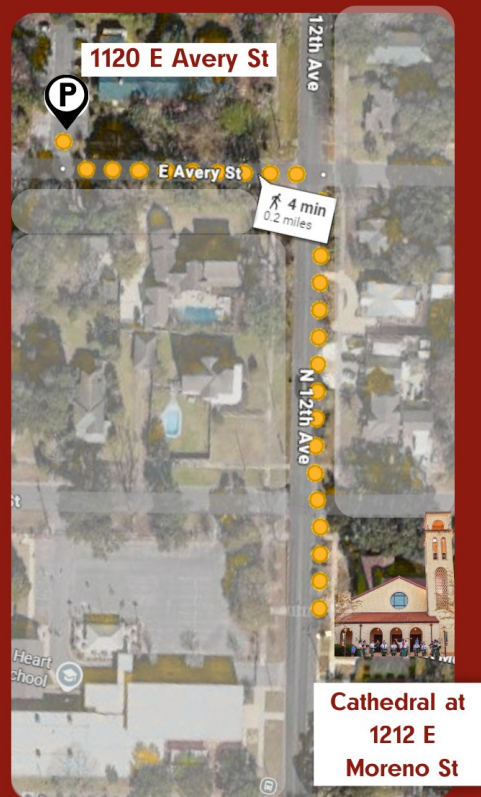

Jonah and the Big Fish - Part 1

The book of Jonah is the shortest book in the Hebrew Bible. Some consider it to be the most Christian of all the books in the Old Testament. Throughout the centuries, Christian writers have come up with numerous symbolisms pointing to Jesus as the new Jonah – how the whale spewing out Jonah is a symbol of Jesus' Resurrection; how God's mercy and love of all people, not just the Hebrews, reflected Jesus' teaching, plus many more symbolisms. Jonah is the only ancient prophet that Jesus identifies Himself with in an explicit way: 'as Jonah was three days and three nights in the belly of the whale so will the Son of Man be in the heart of the earth for three days and three nights'. 'Nineveh repented at the preaching of Jonah and there is something greater than Jonah here.' 'This generation seeks a sign but no sign will be given it but the sign of Jonah.'

One thing we need to know about the book of Jonah is that it is not a telling of events that took place in antiquity, it is a parable. And as with all parables there is a lesson we are to take from it. In fact there are three major lessons, or teachings, that can be derived from this book/parable. The first is we must listen to and be obedient to the Word of God. The second is that we must not try to hide or run away from God. We can't hide from Him anyway so it is a futile gesture. The third is that of the infinite compassion of God which we are called to emulate as best we can.

The English word obedience comes from the Latin word *obaudire* which means to listen. Adding the prefix 'dis' gives us the negative, so disobedience means 'not to listen'. Many times in the Gospels we hear Jesus say – whoever has ears to hear ought to hear. This doesn't mean that we only need to pay attention to what He says, it means that we need to be obedient to what He says. Jonah disobeyed God and while he was asleep in the hold of the ship, a storm arose. The sailors try everything they can to save the ship and they call upon Jonah for help – help through praying to God. This storm causes Jonah to examine his actions and admit that he is the cause of all the troubles and should be thrown overboard to save the ship. The reality of Jonah's disobedience has to be faced and the consequences accepted. So the sailor reluctantly throw Jonah overboard and the storm dies down. When we are being disobedient to God (sinning), there are consequences – the 'storms' that arise in our lives and which we may extend to others.

We too must face the reality of our disobedience and the consequences must be faced. After refusing to do God's Will, Jonah is described as going down to the port of Joppa, going down into the ship and then going down into the hold of the ship where he goes to sleep. This triple 'going down' or descent is an attempt to run away from God. When we try to run away from God, our lives can be described as a descent into chaos or spiraling downward out of control. That is what the book of Jonah is describing and the storm is the chaos of life caused by running away from God. But God did not abandon Jonah and He won't abandon us. Enter the big fish as the book of Jonah calls it and what Jesus in the Gospels calls a whale. The storm causes Jonah, after reflection, to admit his guilt, his disobedience, and then the whale plays a two-fold role.

In the next part we will see what those two roles entail.

While it is incredibly difficult to leave such a wonderful parish and role, I hope to stay in touch with many of you and will certainly be back to visit. Jared and I will continue to keep this parish in our prayers, and we kindly ask that you keep us, and our growing family, in yours as well.
